VA's history in a nutshell

- VA roots can be traced back to 1636 - Pilgrims passed a law requiring the colony to support disabled soldiers
- 1930 President Herbert Hoover created Veterans Administration
- President Reagan elevates VA to cabinet status in 1988 creating the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs

- Three Nobel Prizes in medicine/physiology

- VA & Department of Defense are helping the National Football League (NFL) study Traumatic Brain Injuries
- High-tech prosthetics DEKA arm; highheel friendly prosthetic
- Million Veteran Program (MVP) establishes world's largest databases on health and genetic information for research



he DEKA arm features six preprogrammed grips that allow users to do a variety of weryday tasks, from handling small, delicate objects to using tools.

Staff are working hard to make sure every Veteran is seen and has access to the care they need when and where they need it. We've hired more clinical staff, increased clinic space, extended clinic hours, upgraded scheduling software, ramped-up training, conduct regular scheduling reviews, and are working more closely with community providers, referring Veterans out to private providers for care.
